A MAJOR PUBLIC HEALTH PROBLEM THAT CONTINUES TO GROW

The problem of heart failure affects women more than men yet there is little trial data to support our therapies. The lack of knowledge is because of enrollment restrictions in clinical trials and the fact that for years this disparity has been overlooked. With a broader understanding of the problem the medical community may be able to have a dramatic impact on one of the leading causes of morbidity and mortality in women.
