Registration is limited to the first 100 USA nurses and the first 100 non-USA nurses who apply. Registration closes when this quota is filled and no later than May 15. Option 1: Includes conference registration, meals, breaks and lodging \$625

Option 2: Includes conference registration, meals, breaks but NOT lodging. \$475

Option 3: One Day (available Tuesday and Thursday only) \$165

Includes conference registration, meals, breaks for ONE DAY only. One day registration is available in advance only as space permits. *There will be NO walk in registration*

Guest: Includes meals, lodging, NYC trip \$450

Lodging - Accommodations will be in Monmouth University air-conditioned dormitory suites. There are both single and double rooms. Linens will be provided, but not toiletries. Meals will be served at the University dining halls and are included unless otherwise noted. Conference participants can choose to stay in hotels or a bed and breakfast in the surrounding area, but must provide their own transportation to the conference site.

Host Program - Would you like to open a door to friendship and understanding and extend your stay with a host family? Or do you live locally and would you like to host a visiting school nurse and family? The length of stay varies and can be from 2 days to one week. Please indicate your interest on the registration form so that we can match visiting school nurses and host families. There are no fees for the host program.

The conference site is located in West Long Branch, NJ, Monmouth University with state-of-the-art facilities on a magnificent campus. (There are no shuttle buses to campus locations.) The University is approximately 50 miles from NYC and Philadelphia and is within walking distance to the beaches of the Atlantic Ocean. The University is about 45 minutes from Newark Airport by car and is also accessible by car from LaGuardia and Kennedy airports in New York, as well as from the Philadelphia Airport. There is ample parking on campus. Monmouth University prefers that conference participants arrive on Monday, July 27after 11 AM. If you must arrive on Sunday, July 26, lodging will be available for an extra fee for that one night. Check in is from 4:00PM-7:00 PM only. Meals will not be available at the University until the Monday evening barbecue. Please indicate on the registration sheet if you must arrive early. Cancellations before July 1, refund minus \$50. After July 1, no refund. Travel insurance is recommended. Register early—space is limited! Participants from other countries are asked to consider submitting a bid for SNI.
